The First Assembly of God church, 44314 N. 20th St., Lancaster, will open its annual Missionary Convention, Tuesday, Feb. 16. Services will be held at 7 p.m. nightly, except Friday and Saturday nights, through Sunday, Feb. 21, reports Pastor T. Collins.

This year, the church will welcome as the special guest speaker, the Rev. and Mrs. Hittenberger, formerly associated with the Lancaster assembly in the position of assistant Pastors. The Rev. and Mrs. Fred Cottriel were serving the church at that time.

Yes, Hittenberger, a native Tucson, Ariz., is a graduate of Southern California College, Costa Mesa. He and Mrs. Hittenberger were appointed as missionaries to Haiti in June 1965 and concluded their first term of service during the summer of 1969.

Haiti is a beautiful island, 90 per cent mountainous, with the greatest density of population in the Western Hemisphere. Religion and Vodoodoo is practiced everywhere, and for the most part, the country is still enveloped in ritual darkness, the couple stated.

It is against this backdrop that the Assemblies of God conduct their missionary program in a steady hand. Now in its 11th year, "Les Assemblies de Dieu" is a growing organization.
