

Feather River Project Routes Raise Valley Hopes for Water

If provisional routings recommended by the State Department of Water Resources are adopted by the State Water Commission, supplemental

water for Antelope Valley will be assured.

That is the encouraging word following release of a map outlining provisional

routing of the Feather River Project aqueduct to be unveiled at a hearing of the California Water Commission at 10 a.m. Feb. 26 in the State Building, 217 W. First St., Los Angeles.

Aqueduct routes and factors affecting route selection will be fully explained by the staff of the Southern District Office of the Department of Water Resources, said Bob Alkins, Antelope Valley East Kern Water Basin Association director.

The hearing will be the second on provisional aqueduct routes to bring surplus water from the Delta Pool in northern California to the Southland.

Alkins offered the Valley Press a "capsule form" review of late water news. He returned recently from Sacramento where the FRPA held a monthly statewide conference.

Gov. Edmund G. Brown met with a delegation of FRPA directors and advisors during the two-day meet.

Alkins said the governor talked individually with all members of the board and in later conferences the members expressed themselves as "well pleased" with the chief executive's manner.

At the luncheon five directors will be elected to three-year terms.

ASK HEARING CONTROL DIST

Progress Association Petitions for Meeting

Directors of the Antelope Valley Progress Association voted Tuesday to conduct a study of the proposed county flood control district project for Antelope Valley. Vice President Charles Colby was named chairman of the study group.

"We shall analyze all phases of the plan: flood control, water conservation, and property protection. The magnitude of the project is of great consequence from the standpoint of expenditure," said Colby after the meeting.

Other board members noted that there had been no public hearing in Antelope Valley on the proposed flood control district. To be sure that the project is fully understood by property owners and taxpayers the association voted to formally petition the Board of Supervisors for a public hearing to be held in Antelope Valley announced executive director Clifford L. Dawson.

President John Valentine stated that the association would, as a matter of general policy, seek to develop factual data and interest in matters of valley concern such as flood control. He noted that as the valley grows so do its problems and the need for action which thinking valley leaders can cope with more effectively than anyone else. Other matters will go before the valley hands initially to the county government.

Directors of the proposed district cover all of Antelope Valley and joins an existing county flood control district in its present northern boundary.

The AVPA believes that the public hearing advocated will be educational and important to everyone and will develop detailed information concerning the county's plans, said Dawson.

Just three weeks ago the county Board of Supervisors acted to submit a bill to the State Legislature to create the proposed flood control district.

The supervisors included in the bill a change which would put the district under the direct control of the five-man board of supervisors rather than in a locally elected board of directors, as originally proposed by the County Counsel.

The act also provides that the district would have the power to tax and to assume an indebtedness of \$1½ million to build flood control projects and to operate the district.

Chairman of the freeway and transportation committee, Lamont Odell, reported that initial steps have been taken to arrange a conference with state and county officials in

Los Angeles, and that all civic groups, chambers of commerce, realty boards, etc., in the Valley are being urged to join in the campaign to hasten construction of the freeway.

Agreement between the state and county is expected to be signed in the near future so that right-of-way money in the present budget can be spent in the immediate months ahead.
