

High Desert Cities Officials Briefed on Impact of Airport

The development of the Palmdale Intercontinental Airport and its impact on the cities of the high desert were spelled out Friday noon at a special meeting in Palmdale.

Guest speakers at the luncheon held at Howard Johnson's restaurant were Clifton Moore, general manager of

the Los Angeles Department of Airports, and Ray Cushman, regional planner, of the LA County Regional Planning Commission.

Palmdale Mayor Larry Chimbole invited representatives of the cities of Adelanto, Tehachapi, California City, Ridgecrest, and Victorville. Nearly 40 persons participated.

In opening the program, Chimbole suggested that the

same group meet in the future and remain in close communication for mutual benefit of the cities involved.

California City Mayor James Riley, at the conclusion of the meeting, again suggested that the group

meet periodically in the future.

Moore pointed out that the interim Palmdale Air Terminal is now under construction at Air Force Plant 42 and should be ready for operation this spring. He predicted that

at least two airlines will be operating from the facility shortly thereafter.

He said that \$54 million has been spent in land acquisition for the Palmdale Intercontinental Airport already, with nearly 1500 acres acquired thus far, representing an area larger than Ontario Airport (1100 acres) and nearly half the size of Los Angeles International Airport (more than 3000 acres).

He said that by June 30 of this year, about \$12-million will have been spent on acquisition and by the end of 1971 the total will be about \$30-million.

Total cost of the 18,000 acres of land is expected to be about \$65-million. It is expected that all the land will be acquired by the fall of 1973.

He pointed out that Los Angeles County has hired a planning firm for the airport environs and that the Department of Airports has asked for proposals from firms interested in planning the airport itself.

Cushman said that consideration is now being given to a freeway that would go underground beneath the airport, with ramps to serve the

The ski-masked gunmen robbed Mrs. Jordan at her home at 9:30 p.m. Thursday evening, obtaining approximately \$1880 in currency and jewelry including pearls, necklace, earrings, cameo pins and antique jewelry, valued at least at approximately \$200 more.

Mrs. Jordan told officers she was getting into her car when she observed the two

Vehicle Fees Division Brings Palmdale \$8157

With funds distributed according to population, the first apportionment of motor vehicle license fees for fiscal 1970-71 returned to the City of Palmdale \$8157.00, based on a population of 10,815. Los Angeles County's population of 6,844,000 returned \$4,074,041.91. State Controller Houston I. Flourney reports the State's cities and counties shared \$23,333,241 in this first of three apportionments to be made during the current fiscal year. Those during April and June will be larger since the bulk of fees are collected during January and February each year, Flourney added.

The recent allocation represented slightly over 75 cents for each city resident; almost 60 cents for each county resident, based on adjusted 1960 federal census figures. Results of the 1970 federal census have not yet been received.

The State Excise Tax at the rate of \$2 per \$100 of market value takes the place of local property tax on motor vehicles. The money is returned to local governments except for the portion withheld to cover administrative costs.
