

## Republican Hits Veteran Care

"What most returning servicemen want is not government unemployment insurance or other feather-bedding, but to be let strictly alone to make their own way," Maj. John G. Adams, director of Young Republican Activities, said yesterday. Formerly on Gen. Eisenhower's staff, he has been touring 28 States, studying the political situation.

"There is no doubt," he said at the Biltmore, "that most returning veterans don't want statism, and clearly see that their own personal lives already are far too much affected by bungling government."

Maj. Adams is acting as liaison officer between young Republican groups and the Republican National Committee. He has offices in Washington. He came from Sioux Falls, S.D.

## Antelope Valley Proposal Tabled

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 19. (AP)—The old Los Angeles vs. Owens Valley water feud flickered briefly in the Legislature again today as the Senate tabled a resolution proposing an investigation by the State Water Resources Board of Antelope Valley's water needs.

Sen. Charles Brown of Inyo County, opposing the resolution introduced by Sen. Jack B. Tenney of Los Angeles, said the aim was to "dump" water from the Owens Valley into another agricultural district, surrounding the town of Lancaster, in Los Angeles County.
