# Antelope Valley Sees Water Dispute Peace

**ANTELOPE VALLEY** — Hopes for water harmony here are seen as two of the major antagonists in a four-year fight have agreed to sign a "peace" agreement. Both the Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency and the Palmdale Irrigation District have voted to sign an agreement. Two other groups, the Littlerock Creek Irrigation District and South Antelope Valley Water Basin Assn. are expected to make decisions on signing the four-party agreement in the next few days. Under the terms of the agreement, the South Antelope Valley groups would withdraw a suit filed last fall against the AVEK agency. The suit sought to nullify the legislative act which formed the agency.

**BARSTOW**—Detroit Mobile Homes, Inc., of Michigan is leasing 50 acres at Daggett Airport, near here, to develop a plant for the manufacture of mobile homes. The site and nine buildings at the airport are being leased from San Bernardino County for \$2,000 a month. Officials of the firm said their investment will total \$500,000. About 250 will be employed at the plant which will go into operation in April.

## North Coast

**SAN LUIS OBISPO**—Russell Nelson, a dairy manufacturing instructor at California State Polytechnic College here, has been named to the Dairy Advisory Committee which will make recommendations to the State Fair board of directors in their planning of a new fair. The new committeeman joined the Cal Poly dairy husbandry department in 1950 after coming from Kansas State University, where he served as a dairy specialist and instructor.

**SOLVANG**—The Board of Supervisors has accepted the

resignation of veteran Solvang constable B. B. Bumpass, effective March 1. Bumpass said ill health prompted his plan to resign, although his present term does not end until 1967. He has served for 20 years and feels the position has heavy responsibilities and long hours that are not provided for in compensation. The board plans to act later to name his successor.

**SAN DIEGO** — The first day in their new home was tragic Sunday for Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Kraemer. As they were moving belongings into the residence in the Clairemont area, their 10-month-old daughter, Hilarie, moved her walker-stroller unnoticed to the edge of the back yard swimming pool and fell in at a depth of 8 ft. Ten minutes later Kraemer discovered the body at the bottom of the pool, still in the walker-stroller.

**PORTERVILLE** — Mary Collins has been named public health nurse at Porterville State Hospital succeeding Marie Evins, who has transferred to Sonoma County. Miss Collins was graduated from Mt. Sinai Hospital School of Nursing in New York City and received her public health degree from Indiana University.

**LINDSAY** — Robert Tienken has been appointed chairman of the citizens committee to promote authorization of \$860,000 in bonds and accepting state aid to construct a new \$1.6 million high school building. Trustees of the Lindsay Unified School District have scheduled an election on the high school issue for March 12.
