Palmdale C of C Backs AVEK's Bond Election

The Palmdale Chamber of Commerce is on record favoring approval of the \$49 million Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency bond elec-

tion to be held Feb. 16. A twothirds majority will be required for passage.

The endorsement came following a talk by AVEK General Manager Wally Spinarski at the chamber's luncheon meeting held yesterday at the Oasis Bowl. Spinarski was introduced by newly-elected President A.S. Harry Alfeo who was conducting his first chamber session. Approximately 30 attended.

Motion to endorse the water election was made by Larry Granger, the second by Steve Chaudet, with no dissenting votes.

Spinarski told the group the Valley faces a serious water problem since the ground supply is diminish-textending from one end of ing on an average throughout the area of between 5 and 6 feet annually.

And it follows, he said, that it's becoming more expensive each year to pump the ground water supply.

He estimated that, the supplemental water supply, which would become available with would be \$12,300,000 for pipe the bond passage, would mean line hooking into the aquea savings of \$10 million pump-duct. ing expenses alone, from 1972-

Spinarsky traced the history of AVEK noting that it was originated in 1959, the agency contracted for state water in 1963 and delivery is scheduled to start next year.

Herreported the AVEK contract calls for a maximum of 138,000 acre feet per year by 1990 which would be sufficient to supply a population of 700,-000, and there'd be nine delivery points along the aqueduct,

the Valley to the other.

It's been projected, Spinarski said, of the \$49 million dollars, labor would account for \$19,600,000 of the total and the remainder of \$29,400,000 for materials and supplies.

Major construction cost

"If the bond issue gains approval, Spinarski said construction would begin immediately with approximately \$20 million being expended the first year.

Plan is that from 1971-76, 100 miles of feeders, or pipes, would be installed. plus seven water treatment plants and reservoirs constructed.

Economically, Spinarksi said the project would create employment in the area, his estimate of 450 jobs for a continuing five-year period. - -
