AVEK to hold water hearing

Local water industry experts say they'll take part in a series of hearings by Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency to evaluate alternative methods to solve the region's water problems.

The first hearing will be held this Tuesday night, Jan. 23, as part of the agoncy's regular directors' meeting, which will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the AVEK headquarters, 554 W. Lancaster Blvd.

During the meeting, the directors are expected to approve a semi-annual payment on the state water contract in the amount of about. \$905,000. AVEK will pay the

year.

President Al E. Skelton said today the Water Agency has signed contracts to deliver State Project Water to local community water systems serving Lancaster, Quartz Hill, Hi Vista, Sun Village, Pearblossom, Acton, Elizabeth Lake, Rosamond, Mojave, Desert Lake and Bo-

He said officials of these water systems met with Water Agency representatives this week (January 16) to determine how they might contribute to the Water Agency hearings.

"Because these retail water

state about \$21/2 million this suppliers are satisfied with the Agency's current supplemental water system proposal, they have indicated some coolness toward exploring other ways," Skelton reported. "However, they have assured the Agency that they will take an active role in the hearings."

> In calling the hearings, the Water Agency noted a twofold purpose. One is to seek out some possible new approach that might prove superior to the Water Agency's plan to build pipelines and other facilities needed to make State Project water available to community water systems. The other objective is to give local taxpayers and water users "hard" facts on which to base their own conclusions about the best way to combat the area's problem of disappearing groundwater supplies.

bad service could lead to the Mojave Airport District taking over complete operation of the aviation fuel concessions there.

This was the feeling of the district's board of directors Thursday afternoon after hearing of several incidents involving private pilots who were unable to refuel their aircraft because neither of the two gasoline concessionaires could be found.

Messinger enters not guilty plea

Accused of stabbing a Lancastor man to death last month in a downtown Lancaster parking lot, 20-year-old Allen Lee Messinger has entered a not guilty plea and his trial set for Feb. 27 in the Van Nuys Superior Court.

Victim was Franklin Yarbrough, 39, who lived at 705 Woodgate, in Lancaster.

A member of the Coast Guard, Messinger was home on leave at the time of the fatal stabbing. Reportedly, he administered mouth-tomouth resuscitation to his victim following the stabbing but Yarbrough was dead on arrival at the Antelope Valley Medical Center.
