Putnam went on to emphasize that a complete and proper analysis of groundwater measurements proves that local groundwater levels are continuing to decline and "there does not appear to be any reversal of that situation coming in the immediate future".

Putnam concluded his testimony with the statement that the Waterworks Districts favor the present plans by Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency to build a system to deliver State Project water to local community water systems.

Water Agency director W. M. (Bud) Redman, who has been serving as hearing officer, commended Englund for participating in the hearings, called to consider alternatives to the Water Agen-

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Monagan assesses Reagan's plans for State's surplus

Some weeks ago, in his State-of-the-State message, the Governor announced the state treasury contained an \$850 million surplus. On Thursday, Feb. 8, he again appeared before the people and proposed a prograin to reduce state taxes, a program largely made possible due to our abundant surplus.

The Governor's plan backs up his statement of January II in which he said that he favored returning the state surplus to those who created itthe taxpayers, Specifically, he proposes a return of the great bulk of the State's \$850 million surplus to Californians by means of a tax credit on this year's income and a delay in the one cent sales tax increase that is glated to be effective on June 1st of this year. The tax credit will be rehated on

beyond a certain level unless the California Constitution was again amended.

Fifteen years from now, state revenues are projected to be \$47 billion, a figure that is five times larger than the \$9.8 billion currently raised by the State. The "revenue control" factor which the Governor's program proposes would gradually, over a fifteen year period, reduce the 8.75 percent of total state revenues which the State presently raises from taxpayers down to 7.15 per-

The issue of equal educational opportunity in the State has not been settled. More millions of state dollars may be needed to correct the situation,

Further, if the federal government continues its "cut and squeeze operations," the State may need its surplus to assure the continuance of important programs,
