> Information received in the Board of Trade office from questionnaires mailed to 150 farmers in the valley indicate an average water level drop of about 10 feet per year in wells used by farmers for irrigation.

It is becoming economically impossible for farmers to pump from the deep wells and new wells are not always productive.

A complete report on the feasability of using California Aqueduct water for agriculture will also be presented at the January 29 seminar.

Roy Hampson from the Lahontan District Water Quality Control Board will review state water quality requirements and report on any problem areas that exist in the Antelope Valley.

Representatives from the AVEK Water Agency along with other water companies and districts will report on present and future water needs in their areas.

Bob Elland, deputy director California Water Project, will report on the costs of aqueduct water for consumption in the Antelope Valley and long range plans for supplying
