# Farm use of aqueduct water will help save supply, Williams says

Using State Project water on presently-irrigated farmland is a fast and economical way to improve groundwater conditions in Antelope Valley, according to an official of Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency.

Agency board member Ruel G. Williams of Rosamond says the Water Project Committee he heads is now working out details of its DAWN plan to make State Project water now flowing through the Valley - available to irrigators as well as city people.

Williams said farmers now pump all their water from the declining groundwater supply. When they can use State Project water, he said, it will allow them to reduce their pumping serve some of the Valley's

from wells and relieve the "overdraft" on the groundbasin that is now lowering the water table an average of more than 9 feet a year, according to data from waterwell operators in the Lancaster basin.

Williams said State Project water applied to farmland will also seep downward to help replenish the groundwater supply, providing another benefit to all local water users in the basin.

A group of Valley farmers has asked the Water Agency to move rapidly to make State Project water available for irrigation use. The Agency's proposed DAWN plan water delivery system is designed to most productive farmland through the same facilities that will serve home water users.


Community water systems now serving more than 90 per -cent of the Agency's population gave signed contracts to buy State Project water through DAWN plan-facilities, the Agency-has announced.

Presently, State Project water can't be used here because there is no local system of pipelines to move it from the aqueduct to the people who need it and have agreed to buy it, Williams points out.

Among the community water systems counting on the new DAWN plan system are those serving Lancaster, Quartz IIIII,
