## \$18 per acre foot set for agricultural water

Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency directors Tuesday night adopted a resolution stating that they intend to consider an amendment to the contract to provide for the sale of surplus water to agricultural users at a rate of \$18 per acre foot.

The board met at 7:30 p.m. in the agency headquarters, 1500 W. Lancaster Blvd.

The directors will consider the amendments at their Nov. 12 meeting.

An agency spokesman said that the proposed amendment would have virtually no effect on the existing contracts for various communities who seek

to take domestic water once the AVEK system is built.

A majority of the voters last June approved a \$71 million bond issue to finance the proposed distribution system.

The amendments will apply to persons purchasing water for replenishment and irrigation purposes.

The agency law authorizes AVEK to sell water for the purpose of relieving the overdraft on the ground basin.

During the meeting, the directors reviewed answers to a questionnaire sent out by the Local Agency Formation Commission of Kern County.

## Girl, 19, kidnapped, brought to AV, raped

Antelope Valley Sheriff's Station detectives are investigating a report by a 19-year-old Cardiff-by-the-Sea woman that she was kidnapped in Los Angeles late Tuesday afternoon, driven to Antelope Valley and forcibly raped.

The victim, white, said she was hitchhiking to Big Sur when she was picked up by a man in a car at Interstate 5 and the Ventura Freeway, about 5 p.m.

The suspect, black, about 21, drove her to South Antelope

Valley where shortly before midnight the victim said he raped her in a remote desert area in the vicinity of 150th St. E. between Avenues O and Q, then drove off.

The Cardiff-by-the-Sea resident walked to Ave. R where she was given a ride by a passerby who drove her to a telephone where she telephoned AV Sheriff's officials and informed them of the criminal assault.

The victim was treated at Antelope Valley Medical Center and released.
