35: The Circuit Court of Appeals rendered its decision as follows:

It is hereby adjudged and decreed that the "Decision of said Board of Commissioners" be and lawfully is in all things affirmed.

And it is further adjudged and decreed that the claim of the appellant to the lands called "Luisi" claimed in this case is good and valid and the same are hereby confirmed to him to the extent of three square leagues of land and no more within the boundaries described in the grant to wit: the "Luisi de Cortes" on the North east, the "Cuesta de la Bellota" on the South, and on the West the place of San Antonio.

Provided that should the quantity of land within said boundaries be less than three square leagues, then compensation is hereby made of such less quantity.

And thereafter the mandate of the Supreme Court of the United States dismissing the appeal allowed in the case entitled Juan Maria Flores vs. The United States, appeal having been filed in the aforesaid District Court, the said District Court at a special term held on the 17th day of March Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and eighty two ordered that the order made at the last term of this court allowing an appeal in this case be vacated and annulled and the claimant is allowed to have such further proceedings in this court as may be necessary or useful in a final decision in favor of the plaintiff or defendant as may be just.

And whereas it further appears that the case was brought before the District Court of the United States for the District of California before
